


Buddy Class Math Carnival

The Importance of Respect is symbolized by the Buffalo. Respect is a crucial value that entails treating others with kindness, listening to their perspective, and considering their well-being. This principle encourages us to treat others as we would want to be treated ourselves. It's never acceptable to intentionally disrespect others or hurt their feelings. The Buffalo represents the value of respect because it provided Indigenous people with food, shelter, clothing, and medicine. Indigenous people respected all living things, particularly the buffalo, by acknowledging its sacrifice, using every part of the animal, and only taking what they needed. By honoring and valuing all living creatures and our environment, we demonstrate respect.
